Below are some suggestions from DKG International on accomplishing this.

Nurture Member Relationships:

- Include a social/fellowship time at meetings that do not include a meal.
- In addition to the 4 required business oriented meetings, plan for a few social events in order to allow members to interact socially.
- Encourage members to listen and respect all members' ideas and viewpoints and consider all views with an open mind.
- Invite members to attend area, state, regional, and international events together. Plan to travel together and provide financial support when possible.
- Assign a member or group of members to reach out to members who are not attending meetings to let them know they are missed and make sure they are well.
- Provide extra support for new members , transferred and reinstated members.
 Consider assigning a sponsor/buddy for each of these members.
- Develop a strategy for including members who can no longer attend meetings regularly:
 - o Help members attend virtually, using Skype or other virtual meeting options.
 - o Hold a meeting or event at the assisted living/nursing facility where a member resides. Visit on holidays to deliver a small gift or flowers.
 - o Plan a ride to meetings for members who can no longer drive.

It's been an exciting couple of months in the Beta Chapter. Though small in number and after having last year experienced the loss of two of our dearest and most devoted sisters, Jane Thompson and Betty Dozier, we have managed to continue on and do things that we know would make them both proud of "their" Beta Chapter.

Applications for our scholarship for a high school senior going to the education field had shrunk; this dramatically coupled with the dwindling numbers of college students declaring education as their major, we decided we would reach out to the local high school and she what could be done to help the "Future Teachers" club. We quickly learned that there was only a non-active club and even more concerning was that the high school had closed the Pathway in Education because only 4 students in a class of nearly 300 plus had declared interest in the "Teacher Pathway". After contacting the sponsor (one of our past students), she agreed to accept the \$150 and utilize it in a way that could support a club revival. We just found out that she was able to fund 14 students who qualified to take a national industry certification exam at the end of the semester. With a cost of \$30 each, our donation would help lower the cost for those students and spur their interest!

Our project this year is promoting reading in elementary schools in our area. In September, we visited Ward Elementary determined to read to kids and spread some excitement for reading. Our mission was accomplished! Eleven classrooms had a guest reader who read, engaged the kids in discussion and left behind the book and a character stuffed animal for the classroom. All students received a bookmark and each teacher a Sharpie surprise! We left smiling and happy and even received a request from an excited principal to return to read before Christmas! A follow up thank you has been delivered to each of the teachers who allowed us in their classroom along with an invitation to join DKG and the Beta Chapter.


Fall Workshop Review




