DKG INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION NEW ORLEANS

The 2022 Convention in New Orleans is July 12 - 16, 2022 and will be held at the Sheraton Hotel at 500 Canal St. Many activities have been planned as you can see on the Schedule at a Glance. Registration increases on June 13, so if you are interested, register now. Member registration for the week is \$200. If you will be in the area and want to attend for one day, it would be \$85. If you know you will be attending the birthday luncheon, and you want to participate in the Sazerac House Event, those two can be combined with your registration fee for \$345 which is a small savings for you. Be sure to register for your region's breakfast which is at 7am on Friday, July 15.

International wants to fill the block so please register to stay at the Sheraton. It is easy to book your room from the DKG website, but if you prefer to call, that number is (504) 525-2500. The block officially closes on July 4, 2022, though it is best to reserve your room as early as possible. It can be cancelled up to three days before the event.

You can take the DKG Tours planned by International, or you can sightsee on your own. The Sazerac House is across the street from the Sheraton, and not far away is the Mardi Gras World Art Museum where all the floats are stored and kept on display. The entrance fee is about \$22; however, you may need to show your Covid-19 vaccination card, or a test receipt showing that you tested negative within so many hours of your visit. There are many things to do in New Orleans and if you have never been to Bourbon Street, visiting this street is an event in itself.

As at all International Conventions, there are proposed amendments that will be addressed during the business sessions. Your chapter president will be sharing these amendments and you must tell her how you would vote, so she can let your state president know how to vote. She votes for you, the membership, in Kentucky. You can find the amendments, and more information on the website: www.dkg.org.

If you have never been to an International Event, consider going. It is amazing to see the workings of our society on a larger scale. There are breakout sessions, opportunities to network and meet educators from all over the world, and there is a marketplace. Consider planning to attend this year's convention in New Orleans! You will have a great time if you do!

Rules Article

At our Kentucky State Convention held March 18-20 in Bowling Green, those in attendance voted to amend the Kentucky State Organization Bylaws and Standing Rules as follows:

Section 1. State Officers

A. The state officers shall be a president, a first vice president, a second vice president, a secretary (all elected), and a treasurer (appointed by the Executive Board). The state Executive Board may, at its discretion, appoint a state executive secretary.

Section 2. Duties of Officers and Related Personnel

E. The secretary shall:

- 1. record in writing the minutes of all Executive Board meetings;
- 2. call and record the roll at the general session;
- 3. distribute the typed minutes to The State Organization News editor for publication in the Kentucky State Organization News thirty (30) days prior to the next State Organization meeting;
 - 4. maintain and file the minutes after each meeting in a book of minutes for future reference.
 - 5. receive and respond to all Executive Board correspondence as appropriate to the method of such correspondence;
 - 6. maintain a record of correspondence and communications with the Executive Board;
 - 7. read correspondence as received by the Executive Board at its Annual meeting;
 - 8. serve as chair of the State Organization Communications Committee.

In addition, those in attendance voted that this amendment combining the positions of Recording Secretary and Corresponding Secretary into a single Secretary office will go into effect in 2023 at the beginning of the 2023-2025 biennium. Please make note of this in your copy of the KSO Bylaws and Standing Rules.


