

FLOOD RELIEF UPDATE

Thanks to the generosity of sisters from Kentucky, across the US and all over the world, we've been able to make a small difference in the recovery of teachers and students in Eastern Kentucky. Luckily, the project at Hindman Elementary didn't take the initial estimate to get back up to par. Many of their books, materials and supplies for the guided reading program had been moved to top shelves and were saved from the raging flood waters. We were able to send enough funds to replace the parts of that program that were destroyed. So, since everyone had been so generous, we were able to start helping the teachers and students at West Whitesburg Elementary School which was also totally damaged by the flooding. The occupants of West Whitesburg is going to take an extended period of time, the teachers, <u>students</u>, and staff from there will eventually move into an alternative school after it is cleaned from the flood. We have finished stocking a kindergarten classroom which happens to be the one where our sister Angela Craft from NU chapter teaches. This including some shelving, chart stands along with other teaching supplies. We are currently working with Angela and her Principal to determine what other needs there are for the teachers and students of West Whitesburg while they are "living" in temporary spaces. The remainder of the money collected for flood relief will be used to fulfill as many of those needs as we can.

THANK YOU – your generosity has made a horrible situation more manageable.

MAKING KENTUCKY MORE LIVELY



Leadership Training Opportunities

The Same Training Two Different Ways

Members who wish to participate in leadership training may choose to participate all in one day or over a time period of four weeks – one hour each week. These trainings will be virtual but one of the goals is to make it feasible to hold in-person trainings. The first "in one day" virtual training will be held on Wednesday, December 28, 2022. This training will begin at 10am EST (9am Central). Each session will last for one hour with a ten minute break in-between each session. The schedule with topics is listed below to show you the time span of this "in one day" training. The four week training would use the same exact topics but would meet on the same day and time four weeks consecutively, probably in the summer months, and in February (Thursdays, 6pm EST) Your chapter president will receive a registration form the first week in December.

Virtual Leadership Training Opportunity

Session 1: 10am EST; 9am Central (1 hour)

Introduction. Paradigms, Principles, and Being Proactive. We must understand our own journey before we can understand where others are and be able to listen and communicate honestly with them.

Session 2: 11:10am EST; 10:10am Central (1 hour)

Begin with the end in mind but put first things first. Be positive and think Win-Win.

Session 3: 12:20pm EST; 11:20am Central (1 hour)

The call to courage, the armor, staying grounded, seeking first to understand, and then being understood.

Lunch and Social Time: 1:20pm EST; 12:20 Central (40 minutes)

Session 4: 2:00pm EST; 1:00pm Central (1 hour) Living into our values, braving trust, and daring to lead. Conclusion.
